RE: Opposition to AB 1331 – Workplace Surveillance

Dear Assemblymember Elhawary,

We are writing to express our opposition to Assembly Bill 1331, which, as currently drafted, is overly vague and would have unintended consequences that jeopardize public safety and hinder law enforcement investigations. While we understand the intent to address concerns over workplace surveillance, AB 1331 lacks the necessary clarity to ensure that essential security measures, such as video surveillance in retail establishments, for example, remain intact.

Video surveillance plays a critical role in deterring crime, protecting employees and customers, and assisting law enforcement in solving cases. Under the bill's broad language, many retail businesses could be forced to eliminate or severely limit their use of security cameras, making it more difficult for law enforcement to access crucial evidence in cases ranging from burglary and robbery to assaults and even traffic collisions. Without access to video footage, investigations could be significantly delayed or even compromised, ultimately undermining justice for victims and making our communities less safe.

Additionally, AB 1331 does not adequately differentiate between invasive employer monitoring practices and the necessary security measures businesses use to protect their employees, customers, and assets. This lack of clarity creates uncertainty for businesses, potentially exposing them to legal challenges while reducing their ability to maintain safe work environments.

For these reasons, we oppose AB 1331 unless significant amendments are made to ensure that security-related surveillance, particularly in public-facing businesses, remains protected.
